Funding an Author or Illustrator Visit to Your School

Teachers, Librarians, Booksellers, Authors and Illustrators all have the same objective; get books in the hands of students!

We also face the same realities of slashed budgets and dwindling funds. Even tried and true sources such as PTO funds have been strapped.

Teachers understand all too well the process of planning, preparing, organizing, and gathering materials for an hour's lesson. Visiting authors and illustrators also spend many hours preparing, communicating with the school and traveling; all to make sure that the students have the best experience possible. Here are some ideas for gathering funds to pay for an author or an illustrator to visit YOUR school.

Some general sources for outside funding:

- National service organizations like Lions Clubs, Rotary Club, Kiwanis, etc.
- Large business corporations like McDonalds, Burger King, Kroger, Publix, Home Depot, Lowes, and many more.
- Local independent businesses. (Check with your Chamber of Commerce.)
- National philanthropic groups: Bill Gates Literacy programs, Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.
- The PTA may also have a list of sources that have helped in the past.
- Friends of the Library might be willing to sponsor a visit to the public library
